Postal Money Order released July 2025

Suspect Fraud?

Here's How To Check

- Discoloration around the dollar amounts may indicate the amounts were changed.
- Paper fiber disturbance around the dollar amounts may indicate the amounts were changed.
- The numeric and written dollar amounts should match.
- Watermarks that are easily visible, or unusually pronounced, without even holding the money orders up to a light source, may indicate fraud.

Notices

- The 2009 versions of the Postal Service money orders will continue to be sold until all existing stock is depleted. As money orders do not expire, you may continue to see them presented for redemption for years to come.
- As of October 1, 2024, USPS no longer sells international money orders. USPS will no longer cash international money orders after September 30, 2025.

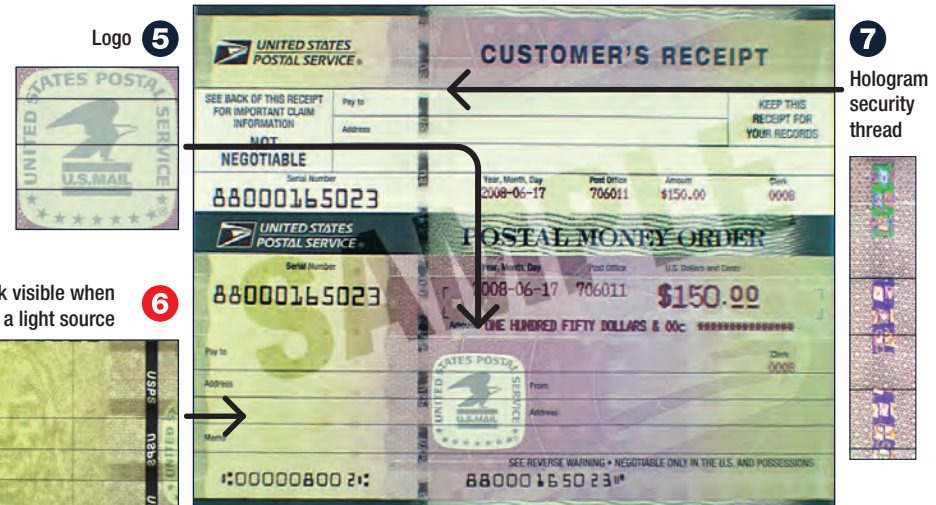
